

The Legalizers Narrative


War on drugs is lost and counter-productive



Violation of human rights, spend our resources on health (harm reduction) and treatment <u>instead of</u> the criminal justice system




Harm minimisation policy: decriminalization/legalization of some or all drugs, starting with cannabis



Mounting a modern defense of the Mind

- Win the idea of cannabis
 - Concret harms of use based on credible facts
 - Dissect the myth of medical marijuana
 - Emphasize communitarian values (caring for each other)
- Environmental prevention
- Emphasize the roal of the criminal justice system to promote treatment and uphold norms of non-use

Mounting a modern defense of the Mind

- Step out of the trench honest and open debate
- Disaggregate prohibition of drugs from other issues:
 - Economy
 - crime
 - human rights
 - security
 - class
 - ethnicitity etc
